Dear IRC,

The Village of Scarsdale should not be divided in the drawing of legislative districts. We have a unified town and Village government, and our schools and Village are coterminous. As Scarsdale elected officials, we represent the collective best interest of our community, and we speak as one voice.

Both the proposed Letters and Names draft Congressional Districts would be a better fit for Scarsdale than the current Congressional district (**District 16**). Scarsdale shares similar interests with other communities in southern Westchester County, particularly the other towns and villages. Scarsdale also has shared interests with the communities along the Metro-North Harlem line and neighborhoods in the cities and towns that border Scarsdale. The proposed Letters and Names Congressional Districts (**District S** and **District YONKERS**) would better serve the Scarsdale community by placing the village in a district that is almost entirely contained within Westchester County.

Both the proposed Letters and Names draft Senate Districts work for Scarsdale, keeping the village whole and placing it in Senate districts that are mostly made up of southern Westchester communities. The two proposed districts (Senate **District AM** and **District Yonkers**) also have the advantage of placing Scarsdale in the same district as the Town of Mamaroneck. This is important because a small portion of the Scarsdale School District extends into the northern part of the Town Mamaroneck, and these plans would unite the school district within a single Senate district. While in prior decades, Scarsdale and Mamaroneck were together in a single Senate District, for the past decade the Scarsdale school district has not been whole within a single State Senate or State Assembly district.

The Assembly Letters plan places Scarsdale in a district (**District CK**) with minimal changes to the current district (**District 88**). This plan works well for Scarsdale, keeping it with similar southern Westchester communities, including the towns of Eastchester and Pelham, the villages of Bronxville, Tuckahoe, Pelham and Pelham Manor, and neighborhoods in the cities of White Plains and New Rochelle that have institutional connections to adjoining parts of Scarsdale.

The Assembly Names plan divides the village of Scarsdale into two entirely new Assembly districts (Districts **WHTPLNS** and **CNTRWSCHSTR**). The IRC should not divide Scarsdale into multiple Assembly districts. Scarsdale has a population of just over 18,000. Dividing the municipality into multiple districts would prevent the community from having a single representative who would understand and be able to advocate for the Village's interests.

This proposal also ignores the requirement of maintaining the cores of existing districts. Scarsdale has been in a district with Eastchester, Bronxville, Tuckahoe, Pelham, Pelham Manor and parts of New Rochelle and White

Plains through several redistricting cycles. Dissolving the core of that district would remove the continuity of representation that the Scarsdale has had for decades.

On behalf of all of Scarsdale, we urge you to keep Scarsdale united.

#### Richmond Hill

Richmond Hill and Ozone Park are neighborhoods where Hispanic residents are the plurality group. In sections adjacent to Woodhaven, they're the majority group. Commission hearings and submissions have heavily emphasized the South Asian and Indo-Caribbean community centered in South Richmond Hill and South Ozone Park. But people repeatedly confuse these four distinct neighborhoods.

Many New York City neighborhoods contain overlapping communities, these four neighborhoods are no different. But I hope the Commission keeps neighborhoods intact to the extent practical. Some neighborhood divisions reflect clearly different socio-economic and demographic groups with limited interaction, but others do not.

#### Middle Village

Maspeth, Middle Village and Glendale are adjacent central Queens neighborhoods marked by lower density, high automobile ownership, and high home ownership. Neighborhood groups such as the Juniper Park Civic Association and COMET help bind them together. Their commonalities are one reason why together they form New York City Council District 30. It's a diverse area where Hispanic and Asian residents are almost half the population. But some proposals to the Commission divide these three neighborhoods unnecessarily. I urge the Commission to resist partisan gerrymanders and keep these neighborhoods together to the extent practical.

#### **Jackson Heights**

Proposals that append large blocks of southern Jackson Heights (Historic District and Garden Co-ops) to either Elmhurst or Corona Assembly districts dilute the voices of working class Asian and Hispanic immigrants. The Commission's Letters Plan correctly places higher income, higher formal education, higher turnout Jackson Heights residents in a Jackson Heights district entirely north of Roosevelt Avenue.

The Letters Plan reflects that (1) Elmhurst and Woodside and (2) North Corona and Corona residents are lower propensity voters. Citizenship and turnout rates are lower in these heavily immigrant communities. Because housing is dominated by one to three family houses often with limited English speakers, engagement is more difficult. Unlike densely populated co-op apartment blocks with fluent English-speaking professionals more common in Jackson Heights.

I urge the Commission to follow the Letters Plan division of Assembly districts and to discount maps by some non-partisan redistricting coalitions. They might reflect the political interests of incumbents and affluent Jackson Heights residents, but they don't reflect the working class immigrant communities in Corona, North Corona, Elmhurst and Woodside.

#### **Dear Commission Members -**

I'm now 71 years old and graduated from Stony Brook University (SBU) before some of you were born. After more than fifty years living in this community I have not only seen the University blossom, I've seen Brookhaven National Lab blossom, and I've seen the fruits of their union. They have made Suffolk County what it is. They are not only our largest employer, they are Suffolk's largest creator of jobs through their research and incubators.

You were chosen because you understand politics. Here's the politics of why it is so important to keep the Lab and University together in NY1. Whether it has been Democrat Tim Bishop or Republican Lee Zeldin, our Member of Congress has made those two research centers their primary concern. Why? The success of each builds the success of both. No matter what the party, they make incumbency almost a foregone conclusion. And while I may not like it when the MoC is not someone from my party, I still would not separate the two just to try to make NY1 or NY3 more blue, even though I am a Democrat. What is more important is what those two institutions do - together - for our economy and for our quality of life.

If SBU was moved into NY3, as your first map suggested, it would screw SBU, and in the process, hurt BNL. Seriously - NY3, which stretches from NYC to Suffolk, is already an absurdity. To stretch it further to include SBU would leave us with an MoC who would not make SBU their first priority. They care about votes. If most of the people who work at SBU live in NY1 and not NY3 - there's not a whole lot of incentive for the NY3 MoC to put the same effort into a public state university that does not get most of its funding from the federal government as there is for the NY1 MoC who currently reaps the benefits the two institutions combined create.

I don't know all the ED numbers to tell you, but the district line can be very straightforward; if you keep all of the Town of Brookhaven in NY1 - the University, which is in the NW corner of Brookhaven - will stay in NY1 with BNL.

Please, keep BNL & SBU together in NY1!

We share very diverse groups: races, nationalities, ethnicities and religious beliefs, but we also share a common belief in our inter-dependent and cooperative Assembly District administrations. Our interests and needs are the same and our government representatives, be it City Council, State Assembly or State Senator, all work in harmony and have done so for decades.

Your proposed change would suddenly deprive us of our current Assemblywoman Jenifer Rajkumar, slicing her home, and office right out of our District. Why?

In comparing the current, and proposed redistricting maps, I am appalled that you would even consider slicing a portion of Woodhaven, 11421 out of our district. Greetings, My name is Cynthia McKnight, and thank you for the opportunity to present the lines for Congressional District 8. This is an update to my testimony in Albany, New York. I am the President of Community Education Council 13 in Congressional District 8 and a union leader for the AFGE Local 913 of the United States Department of Urban Development. Community Education Councils are an initiative of the state legislature and are responsible for reviewing and evaluating educational programs, assessing their impact on student achievement, and advising the legislature on capital funding and public hearings. I have deep roots in Congressional District 8, and I was raised in Linden Houses in East New York and later moved to Clinton Hills, where I have resided for the last 25 years. I am here to urge the commission to keep our communities of the NY-08 together in a similar configuration to the current lines.

Our communities of interest are linked by public safety, which is why I am testifying as an education and children advocate. Education is the key to public safety, and if you do not educate, you incarcerate. People who experience barriers to educational achievement are disproportionately represented in the criminal justice system, and improving education outcomes is a way to increase public safety. The communities of District 8 are linked by transportation which makes it easier for parents to access better schools for their children. For example, many families in East New York take the B25 bus or three or A train to District 13, 15, and 16 schools,

Congressional District 8 also has the largest number of public housing and is third in the nation for the highest percentage of public housing in a Congressional District. It is paramount that the communities stay together to fairly represent the most vulnerable population. For these reasons, I suggest eliminating Sea Gate and Howard Beach from District 8. Thank you again for allowing me to weigh in on the lines for Congressional 8 and expressing the need to keep our communities unified.

My name is Dorca Reynoso I have been a proud resident of Inwood community, the northern part of the district for the past 35 years. I am a member of Met Council on Housing. The 31st District has for many decades been composed by diverse neighborhoods with shared housing needs, transportation patterns, public school enrollment, civic engagement and houses of worship.

The A, C and 1 train lines the veins that help keep Inwood, Washington Heights, Morning Heights, and the Upper Westside together. These lines run from Inwood to the Upper westside in a pattern that complements the vertical traveling patterns of the residents of Northern Manhattan, they are essential to day to day lives, and meeting our needs. These lines play a role in many aspects of our lives. We as a community very similar patterns when it comes to supporting small businesses and selecting our medical providers

Forcing a Senate district to cross country lines, as proposed by the ITC, will be counterproductive, it will diminish the services and run counter to the boundaries of important civic constituencies such as school districts, community boards and precinct councils none of which spill to other boroughs. It is of great importance for our elected officials to be able to consistently deliver in-person services and here once again is important to note the important role played by our mass transportation system, this in-person engagement is otherwise hindered by our severe vehicle congestion. What is needed is to limit the district to the borough of Manhattan to help ensure strong government services that are cohesive and interrelated.

The above-mentioned neighborhoods are bound by historical, cultural, and civic characteristics. The Dominican community flows from Inwood and Washington Heights to West Harlem (or as some refer to it Hamilton Heights), as well as the City College of New York situated on West 138th Street and home to The Institute of Dominican Studies. The history of the Black community thriving in Harlem is echoed in the Betty and Malcolm X Education Center and Morris Jumel Mansion community in Washington Heights, and further up on the grounds of the Dyckman Public Housing where the Negro Baseball League once stood. The heavy Jewish population on the west side of Inwood and Washington Heights shares houses of worship, causes, and extended family with the Upper West Side. All of these communities worked together via grassroots groups and political clubs, to name a few, to raise issues of environmental justice, affordable housing, saving our small businesses, and progressive electoral representation. Lastly, the diversity embraced in this district has offered the opportunity for critical organizing and unifying dialogue across cultural and socio-economic boundaries to occur, leading to the emergence of thoughtful community and culturally-responsive leadership.

I ask that you strongly consider the above testimony and attached maps in drafting the IRC's lines.

It is extraordinarily disappointing to learn that communities of interest in the Lower Hudson River rivertowns are being targeted for a redistricting in a manner that would break up representation for villages and towns which are clearly communities of interest in a broad array of areas. These areas include towns that regularly collaborate in small business activities, tourism, school activities, civic group actions, and organized environmental and social justice advocacy.

Most egregiously, breakup of NY-17 would undermine the often enunciated goals of promoting environmental and social justice.

The interests of some of these marginalized residential areas within this district are beginning – at last – to be represented.

New York has one (actually more than one – but I focus here on NY-17) of the most brilliant and fresh voices in Congress who has in just a brief period become amazingly knowledgeable on topics which are highly complex and challenging.

I am an attorney who has personally worked, entirely in a pro bono capacity, on a number of environmental and environmental justice issues in the Lower Hudson Valley. I also serve as a advocate for the public interest on energy and nuclear risk issues. I have been most appreciative and relieved at the level of acumen and dedication NY-17 brought to bear on the important and complex issues surrounding Indian Point, the AIM Pipeline, and high-level radioactive waste (spent fuel). It is imperative for the communities in the region as well as for the State of New York that a Congress member which has already demonstrated an ability and willingness to dive into these extremely intricate topics and rather daedal regulatory schemes — and who now has footing in committees and task forces which will be determining energy and radioactive waste related Federal policies — be able to continue this important work.

New York State's Constitution mandates the Commission ensure districts are compact. The Lower Hudson Rivertowns are really one community. This would argue for including Hastings-on-Hudson as part of NY-17; but, in any event, it would most certainly preclude splintering apart the towns which are already part of NY-17.

Finally, communities of color have at long last been able to be heard and have had reason to hope diversity is not just verbiage. What a travesty it would be to roll back these gains for our democracy.

Good afternoon. My name is Blair Horner, and I am Executive Director of the New York Public Interest Research Group (NYPIRG). NYPIRG is a non-partisan, not-for-profit, research and advocacy organization. Consumer protection, environmental preservation, health care, higher education, mass transit, voting rights and governmental reforms are our principal areas of concern. We appreciate the opportunity to comment on the proposed boundaries for New York's congressional, state Senate and Assembly districts.

You have received considerable testimony covering the wide range of redistricting issues. Our testimony focuses on two areas: the issue of population size in the proposed districts and an appeal for you to consider the college students populations as a "community of interest" when drafting your final recommendations to the Legislature.

U.S. Supreme Court rulings have made it clear that legislative districts should be of comparable size. In one case, the Court ruled that "the achieving of fair and effective representation for all citizens is ... the basic aim of legislative apportionment" and it was for that reason that the decision insisted on substantial equality of population among districts.¹ Essentially mapmakers' goals are to keep Congressional districts as close to the average population size.²

Under the U.S. Supreme Court rulings, state legislative districts, on the other hand, are usually allowed to range within 10 percent from smallest population to largest, plus or minus 5 percent of the average size.<sup>3</sup>

Yet as much as a 10 percent difference in populations undermines the core democratic principle of "one person, one vote." When challenged in the past, mapmakers have identified provisions in the state Constitution that they have said makes the standard for Congressional districts impossible for state legislative line drawing.

Previous legislative districts lines have been drawn with wide population disparities as part of a thinly-veiled effort to rig the new political boundaries to benefits one political party over another. While not illegal, New York's current legislative district lines and those under consideration allow for dramatically different populations. As seen below, the vast majority of districts approved ten years ago allowed large differences in populations.

As you see, the districts drawn for the proposed "letters" maps would allow significantly larger population differences than those drafted and in the "names" districts.

### NYPIRG urges you to advance in your final maps, that the population differences be more like those contained in the "names" maps.

An important consideration for the Commission is the treatment of "communities of interest." Our view is that "communities of interest" should include college students that live both on and off campus. We urge that any final Congressional and State Legislative maps treat this community of interest similar to how you would any other. As you have described on your website, a community of interest

"... is a population which shares enough social and economic interests of importance that suggest said community should be included in a single district for effective and fair representation. These might include similar standards of living, shared methods and patterns of transportation, or similar economic and societal concerns."

There can be no doubt that college students – who are counted in the census as living in this community and who can register to vote from their college addresses – meet the above-mentioned standards. College students living on and off campus have "similar standards of living," use similar forms of "transportation," and share similar concerns.

Like any other "community," college communities include a wide variety of interests and ideologies, but as a group of individuals, they are no different from other communities. As such, college students should be offered the same considerations.

There is no doubt that you have a daunting task ahead of you as you push to develop the final maps for submission to the Legislature. However, college students have too often faced obstacles to their right to vote from their college addresses and gerrymandering that weakens their political clout — while the communities in which they live benefit from sales tax revenues, inclusion of their populations in political boundaries, and governmental services that are determined by census population data.

Thus, college students deserve the same consideration offered to other communities of interest. NYPIRG urges you to ensure that any final maps adequately ensure political cohesion for the college student body. Thank you.

#### To Whom It May Concern:

I am a resident of Peekskill, NY, a racially and linguistically diverse environmental justice community that is part of Congressional District NY-17. As one of the Hudson River towns, Peekskill shares a similar economic and societal profile with the other towns in this category, as well as a direct concern regarding a number of environmental issues: the presence and decommissioning of the Indian Point nuclear plant, the ongoing effect of the Wheelabrator incinerator and the presence of a 42 in. high pressure fracked gas pipeline on the Indian Point premises.

I urge the maintenance of the current NY -17 profile as a way of ensuring the consistency of the election choices made by our community of interest in 2020. Our Member of Congress was the clear choice among the large number of primary candidates against whom he ran, and he has provided highly effective

representation for his constituents.

In my opinion, any representative of our area must be committed to assuring that the decommissioning process at Indian Point is conducted safely and transparently and that the issue of longterm storage of the huge inventory of radioactive spent nuclear fuel is addressed. Many of us in the community fear that this process is now the responsibility of a company with a long profile of fraudulent behavior and are deeply concerned that the NRC is not providing the oversight needed. The current long-term plan for storage involves the use of flimsy (by comparison to our European counterparts) storage casks which will be transported (presumably via the Hudson River) to an unidentified "interim" storage site. Given the fact that there is not at present (and likely will never be) a permanent storage site, the law should preclude the establishment of any interim sites. Furthermore, these sites are all located in poor communities of color – often on or adjacent to indigenous lands. The collective risk of transporting or "disposing" of this waste according to Holtec's plan is unthinkable. Permanent storage on site in more robust casks - hardened on-site storage is the safer and more just solution. Mondaire Jones has fully involved himself in these issues.

Peekskill is home to the most significant source of air pollution in the county – the Wheelabrator "waste to energy" plant where all non-recyclable garbage from most of Westchester County is sent. Westchester's air quality is graded as "F" as a result in large part of the effluence from this plant. This is clearly an issue in dire need of a different solution – mandatory food scrap recycling, legislative pressures to significantly reduce waste and favor reuse must be considered.

The 42 in. AIM pipeline that crosses northern Westchester was permitted several years ago and puts the lives and safety of those in NY-17 at risk, owing in part to the emission of carcinogens and other toxins at the compressor stations along its route, but most significantly because of the colocation of this hazard and the nuclear plant at Indian Point. For years, community activists worked to prevent its construction; now we are fighting to shut it down during the precarious decommissioning period. These are all issues that tie us together in the district and urgently need the

support of a committed MOC.

In summary, I believe that the common location with proximity to the Hudson, similar socioeconomic profile, similar diversity of our populations, and the prevalence of environmental risk are the threads that hold our compact district together and indicate the need for the preservation of the present NY-17 district's geographic profile.

Thank you to the Independent Redistricting Commission (IRC) for organizing this second series of public hearings.

I am <u>Asher Ross, Senior Strategist at the New York Immigration Coalition</u> <u>Action</u>.

The NYIC serves one of the largest and most diverse newcomer populations in the United States. We have over 200 grassroots member organizations across NY state, representing immigrants and communities of color from Buffalo to Suffolk. We serve as a forum for immigrant groups to voice their concerns, as a platform for collective action to drive positive social change.

The NYIC is the lead facilitator of the Mapping Our Future coalition, a statewide coalition of NYIC member orgs and advocates dedicated to mobilizing the grassroots to get involved in redistricting and advocate for a fair process and fair maps.

Over the course of this year our members have engaged in community education, met with numerous elected officials, raised awareness of our

concerns about redistricting in the media-- and dozens have turned out to testify at these public hearings.

Our mission is to elevate the voices of our members in this process, to speak about the impacts that unfair districts and unfair representation have had on their communities and on their everyday lives.

#### Fair districts are the foundation for fair representation.

Currently the elected officials in our state legislature do not reflect the diversity of our state.

NY is 45% non-white, but only 32% of our state legislators are non white. 22% of the state is foreign born, but only 8 % of the legislators are; 35% of ny are either immigrants or the children of immigrants, and only 17% of legislators are. The legislature also skews much older, more male, and more highly educated and upper middle class than the population as a whole.

### This situation is due largely to gerrymandering of communities of color.

We expect this Commission and the State Leg to create districts that keep our immigrant and BIPOC communities whole, and that empower them to elect candidates of their choice.

Unfortunately, this commission failed to come to an agreement in September and instead of one compromise draft map, released two partisan maps.

These maps contain some significant improvements and a clear responsiveness to advocates' testimonies-- particularly for Asian communities in NYC, which we applaud.

However, other groups were ignored. I want to highlight how Arab communities, including those in Bay Ridge, Astoria, Little Yemen in the Bronx are split both in the current districts and in all of the various proposed Assembly and Senate plans. These populations may not appear as distinct communities of interest in the data, as the census codes them as white; but they form cohesive ethnic, cultural, linguistic, and economic communities of interest across NYC and NY state.

I thank the commission for committing to an open process and for maintaining a website with archived meetings, events, and documents. Moving forward, it is now more important than ever to create a partnership between this commission and advocacy organizations. I particularly urge this commission to take a proactive role in engaging with ethnic media around the state. We stand willing to support you in that effort.

I hope this commission will fulfill its mission to create fair maps without the partisan and racially-tinged bias of previous decades.

Thank you again and thanks also to the many partners who are in this fight for fair maps and fair representation.

I represent the West 55th Street Block Association in Manhattan (New York County). We are located on West 55th Street between Eighth and Ninth Avenues. At our general meeting of Nov. 22, we voted unanimously to ask you to reunite our Hell's Kitchen neighborhood (politically speaking) when you draw the district maps for New York State this year. Currently, we are split between districts, as outlined below.

The West 55th Street Block Association also voted to support the solution outlined by Manhattan Community Board 4 on Oct. 22 to reunite Hell's Kitchen. Here is a link to their <u>letter</u> for your reference.

The splitting of our neighborhood under the current map has weakened our ability to participate in state and local government because it has doubled and sometimes even tripled the number of elected officials we have to deal with to find solutions for various community issues.

Hell's Kitchen has, historically, comprised the blocks between West 34th to West 59th Street (north and south boundaries) and Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River (east and west boundaries). Currently, under the current maps, our community is divided between the 27th Assembly District and the 25th Assembly District. The neighborhoods of Kew Gardens Hills, Pomonok, Electchester, and Hillcrest are divided.

I am asking this commission to take into account the unification of Kew Gardens Hills, Pomonok, Electchester, and Hillcrest so that Jewish representation is not diluted in this redistricting process. When this commission redraws the Assembly district lines, please incorporate all neighborhoods mentioned into one assembly district. The aforementioned neighborhoods in the south should be connected with College Point, Northern Whitestone, and Le Havre Cooperative in the north.

The paramount issue for MCB4 in reviewing these maps is that our community district (which is bordered on the south by 14<sup>th</sup> Street, on the west by the Hudson River, on the north by 59<sup>th</sup> Street and on the east, by 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue from 14<sup>th</sup> to 26<sup>th</sup> Streets and by 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue from 26<sup>th</sup> to 59<sup>th</sup>) be kept intact, so that neighborhoods are not divided by Assembly or State Senate districts. The Commission prioritizes keeping towns in rural and suburban areas intact within single districts when new district lines are drawn. Manhattan's District 4 should receive the same treatment and be considered a Community of Interest, since our board advocates for the residents of District 4 and coordinates with city agencies on the provision of their services within our boundaries.

To this end, the Democratic version of the Assembly map comes closest to achieving our needs. The southern border of the Assembly district is pushed south (from the border of the current 75th AD) to 14th Street, matching the district line. While the eastern edge does not exactly follow the district line, tracking Broadway will keep our district whole. We would prefer that the northern edge of the Assembly district be pushed to 60<sup>th</sup> Street, both to track the community district border and to keep the entirety of Hell's Kitchen neighborhood (including the Coliseum Apartments) intact, instead of dividing the northern edge of Hell's Kitchen between Assembly districts. One other aspect of this map that is helpful is that the entirety of Hudson River Park north of 14<sup>th</sup> Street is contained in a single Assembly district.

Conversely, the Republican version of the Assembly map divides Hell's Kitchen between Assembly districts and includes portions of unrelated neighborhoods to the east within the district, including a large portion of the Midtown business district. The failure to include the northwest portion of Hell's Kitchen within the district is a fatal flaw for this plan.

The Democratic version of the Senate map suffers from a similar flaw, dividing Chelsea in half and including Hell's Kitchen and the rest of Chelsea in an Upper West Side district, where our voices will be blunted, instead of the traditional inclusion of our neighborhoods with the Greenwich Village area. Particularly upsetting about this plan is that it divides the Mutual Redevelopment Houses (Penn South) (a group of 10 buildings that are managed as one unit) between two Senatorial districts. This must be corrected.

The Republican Senatorial map is better, in that it keeps our community district together, although the inclusion of the district with the Upper West Side causes the same concerns that the Democratic plan does. The issues that face our district have much more in common with the issues faced in the Village than on the Upper West Side.

Thus, while all of the proposed maps are flawed and need correcting, the Democratic version of the Assembly map and the Republic version of the Senate map at least keep most of our district intact, in line with the principle of a Community of Interest.

As a lifelong Orthodox Jewish New Yorker who loves this state, I have been disappointed with the lack of representation our community has received, and redistricting has a lot to do with that. Borough Park has been separated from the rest of Brooklyn, and placed into a Manhattan-based district. Midwood, the Orthodox Jewish community right next door, has been drawn into a separate Brooklyn district, hence neither community has any influence. I was born in Manhattan, raised in Scarsdale, and will be moving to Manhattan after graduating law school, but am submitting my comments as a concerned citizen of New York, the state I love and call home, and hope you consider this map. Ensuring that communities of interest receive fair representation must be the hallmark of a nonpartisan redistricting process.

My proposed map ensures that communities of interest are paired together. 

Brookhaven Town has a strong shared community of interest, based on historical, economic, scientific, academic, environmental and cultural interests. Splitting the Town into two Congressional Districts as proposed under the Congressional Letter Draft would cause irreparable harm and undercut our economy, civic institutions and feeling of shared history and current purpose.

From the North Shore to the South, Brookhaven Town shares a proud history dating back to the mid-1600s. Our primarily agrarian roots and long tradition as fishermen and whalers shaped who we are today: Pro environment, protective of our farmers, and fierce guardians of our parks, beaches and shores. The feisty, independent ethos of small yeoman farmers and independent fishermen that inspired the famous Setauket-based Culper Spy Ring of Brookhaven residents who risked their lives for George Washington remains a defining characteristic of the community.

Coram, the oldest community in central Brookhaven Town, contributed its Light Dragoons to work with the Culper Spy Ring on acts of sabotage against the British and subsequently became the meeting place of the Brookhaven Town government for 10 years. The Congressional Draft Letter plan would split Coram, the

oldest settlement in central Brookhaven, in two. Ronkonkoma, which is a key transportation hub for Brookhaven Town commuters and residents, would likewise be divided. Considering the money spent to make Ronkonkoma a thriving community hub, the division seems doubly perverse.

Today Brookhaven Town is home to two renowned research centers, SUNY Stony Brook and Brookhaven National Laboratory. Combined, these two research centers are about 50% of the Town's top ten employer's employee count. After WWII, scientists and academics from the two institutions revitalized communities from Bellport in the South to the Three Village area in the North. The two institutions fostered a Townwide commitment to education, embrace of scientific innovation, and civic engagement that remains a vital shared outlook.

Splitting Brookhaven Town's two most dynamic and renowned research institutions into two Congressional Districts would hurt their shared academic and scientific research and negatively impact the economic stimulus they bring to the Town. The scientific and research communities at Stony Brook and BNL – and the many employees throughout Brookhaven Town that they support – benefit from having one member of Congress advocate for them and prioritize their mutual needs. In fact, their ties are numerous and inseparable:

Stony Brook is a partner in Brookhaven Science Associates LLC, managing Brookhaven National Lab for the Department of Energy. Brookhaven Science Associates (BSA) was established for the sole purpose of managing and operating Brookhaven National Laboratory. Formed as a partnership between Battelle Memorial Institute and The Research Foundation of SUNY on behalf of Stony Brook University (SBU), BSA is the legal entity responsible for leading BNL successfully through the 21st century. Stony Brook is the single largest user of BNL facilities; BNL facilities and its scientific staff are essential to the vitality of the university's intellectual life and to the impact of many of its research programs. BNL and the University share an increasing number of joint faculty appointments. Stony Brook and Brookhaven National Lab have formalized collaborations that form communities of interest in educational, economic, and intellectual research. It is

critical that this complex, major economic engine has the benefit of effective representation in Washington, DC, from one member of Congress. Moreover, the proposed division would split Stony Brook's incubators, leaving its Research and Development Park and the Long Island Tech Incubator in one congressional district and its Calverton Incubator in another.

Splitting Brookhaven Town into two Congressional Districts would also undermine the shared interests and improvement efforts of Brookhaven Town's African American communities which have both been historically plagued by political "cracking" and disenfranchisement. Their common purpose to address historical wrongs through Town-wide civic organizations like the Brookhaven NAACP would be severely hampered.

Likewise, the membership of many of Brookhaven Town's most trusted and effective civic organizations like the Brookhaven League of Women Voters would be split apart, endangering our progress on good government reforms and environmental cleanup.

Finally, a commonality of economic realities characterize
Brookhaven Town's North and South Shores. Tourism is a major
part of Brookhaven's North and South Shore economies,
especially during the summer months, which brings a shared
commonality of challenges as well as economic benefit. The surge
in tourists benefits Main Street businesses, cultural institutions and
small and organic farmers in the surrounding areas, but it means
increased seasonal strain on infrastructure and unpredictable
vulnerability during off season months and economic downturns.
Proposed solutions for shared environmental degradation
problems, shore erosion and pollution would also be undermined.

In the mid-19th century, the villages of Port Jefferson in the north and Patchogue in the south prospered as shipbuilding ports and remain Brookhaven Town's largest communities. Both subsequently suffered economic downturns but now, thanks to affordable housing and mixed-use projects, small businesses and cultural centers, they are once again becoming thriving communities. These regional projects on the two coasts are of critical importance to the economic success of the wider Town and

would thus benefit from remaining in the same Congressional District.

The Hell's Kitchen Neighborhood Coalition represents the Block Associations and organizations in the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood of Manhattan, New York. We want to make the following observations and requests on the Committee's preliminary redistricting maps.

Our small and close-knit neighborhood is currently split in both the New York State Senate and Assembly maps, which has proven legislatively unproductive for neighborhood residents. As we understand, the Commission's wish to keep neighborhood areas intact within single districts when new district lines are drawn. We hope this will be rectified.

According to the latest redistricting maps, our Hell's Kitchen community is, once again, split between districts. We request for the community of Hell's Kitchen to be kept whole to easily coordinate with city agencies and our representatives on the provision of services within our boundaries — this request is not unreasonable considering our neighborhood is only 30 blocks north to south.

As a resident of Westchester County, I urge you to recognize the importance of maintaining Westchester's independent voice and not having it split apart and diluted by surrounding areas of New York City.

As you know, New York City is a unique and distinct urban center with an infrastructure of its own, and a set of issues and concerns that are wholly distinct from suburban communities like Westchester. If the Commission is given the opportunity to propose a second set of maps, it should use that opportunity to **unite areas of Westchester County**.

It appears that both maps under consideration would continue to artificially link portions of the north Bronx with portions of Westchester in one district, while drawing another district that would link Westchester with portions of both the Bronx and Queens. **These maps are fundamentally flawed** because they dilute the voice of both the suburban community in Westchester (and Putnam counties) and the New York City community in the Bronx and Queens.

Linking Westchester with the Bronx and Queens is particularly unfair and unacceptable because it divides communities in three counties, limiting the ability of residents in each part of the district to have an elected official who can effectively represent their interests.

During last year's public hearings, when residents of New Rochelle testified before the Independent Redistricting Commission, several were asked by Commissioners whether they would want a district connecting New Rochelle to Queens. None said yes, yet the

Commission still drew a Queens to New Rochelle district in both of its proposals.

Rather than having District 14 be contained entirely in New York City and District 16 be the only district to cross the Westchester/Bronx border, as was proposed in the earlier Names and Letters draft plans, the Commission inexplicably decided to cross the county border twice. This decision divides communities throughout the region and would especially dilute the voice of the community of southern Westchester centered around Scarsdale and northern New Rochelle. This area has shared infrastructure and institutions, and both proposals would split this community into not two but three different Congressional Districts.

When the lines were last redrawn, New Rochelle, Scarsdale and other parts of Westchester were joined with the Bronx. Now, ten years later, the Commission's proposals would further dilute Westchester's voice. I urge you to reassess the Congressional map and take action to ensure that Westchester County is not unduly divided.

Dear Members of the Independent Redistricting Commission:

It is my understanding that the Commission charged with redistricting has deadlocked and has not made a bi-partisan recommendation to the Legislature. It is also my understanding that both maps voted on by the Commission would have denied Westchester residents a voice because they combined the County with parts of the Bronx and/or Queens.

You now have the opportunity to remedy the situation and give Westchester a voice by including it in an all-suburban district (standalone or with Putnam County).

What's more, you have an opportunity to listen to the many constituents whose voice was not heard when they attempted to participate in the process: The Commission asked Westchester residents what they thought about being subsumed in a district with the Bronx or Queens and the response was unanimous that such a district would be highly undesirable.

I look to you to devise and approve a map that recognizes that the concerns and needs of Westchester residents are different than those of NYC residents.

The Bronx and Queens — integral parts of New York City — have a unique character, infrastructure and needs compared to Westchester. These very different geographies can not be represented by one person.

The top 5 or 10 concerns of my fellow Westchester residents, and our needs on common issues are different than those of people who live in the Bronx or Queens. The terms housing, infrastructure, and mass transit, for example, have a very different meaning to people in Westchester than they do for people in the Bronx and Queens. (This difference priorities and needs was evident in the past year as Congressman Bowman, my Congressional Representative, seems to have done a good job on issues important to people in the Bronx while mis-representing me on many issues.)

I would be happy to discuss this ... and I hop your decision brings back representation to Westchester resident.

Dear Chair Imamura and Vice Chair Martins:

We are writing today to address Plan A for Congressional, State Senate, and State Assembly and the districts contained therein as they relate to the County of Dutchess.

In Congressional Plan A, 95% (273,750 people) of Dutchess is in one Congressional District and only 5% (17,500 people) is included in a separate district. Dutchess can be kept whole in one Congressional District within the legally allowed deviation. Removing only two towns from the rest of Dutchess would adversely harm those residents by dividing our community and having separate Congressional representatives.

Dutchess has 290,583 residents (adjusted by incarcerated persons) and the average Senate District is roughly 317,000 persons. In State Senate Plan A, despite having enough population for 91% of a Senate District, Dutchess is sliced into three separate districts. Currently, two Senate Districts cover parts of Dutchess and the proposed map unnecessarily adds a third. One proposed district would include the majority of Dutchess residents in a district with four other counties. Additionally, District 51 as proposed is non-contiguous as it is not connected via roadway. This is a blatant attempt at subverting good government practices.

In State Assembly Plan A, District 106 inexplicitly is non-contiguous and does so only to include 10,000 people. A representative must not leave their district in order to reach another part of their district.

All three proposed plans represent a stunning lack of understanding of the local communities of interest, geography, and good government practices.

The County of Dutchess must remain whole in Congressional and State Senate districts and divisions should be minimized in State Assembly districts.

We look forward to seeing these issues corrected. Thank you for your time and understanding.

I am writing to you in my capacity as Executive Director of Democracy Matters, a non-partisan, non-profit organization with active chapters in both Dutchess and Ulster Counties. I am aware that the New York State legislature voted on January 10<sup>th</sup> to reject the most recent maps proposed by this commission. Because of that I am submitting this public comment that I hope will inform your future redistricting proposals.

I want to express my strong concerns about the problematic implications of previous maps you have proposed affecting the 19<sup>th</sup> Congressional District of New York. Previous maps have violated the very strong community of interest that exists among the Mid-Hudson Valley communities on the Hudson River.

The election integrity of residents in these communities must be protected in your proposals for redistricting. First, the Ulster County river communities that are now included in New York's 19<sup>th</sup> Congressional District must not be divided. The division of Ulster County river communities in previous maps ignored the clear evidence that people living in these towns constitute a single community. In addition and just as important, any proposed map must recognize the strong ties between Ulster river towns and their sister communities on the Dutchess County side of the river. A long-standing community of interest exists between Ulster and Dutchess river communities.

In short, I urge you to ensure that the Ulster river communities remain intact, together in one Congressional district as they are at present, and that that district also include the Dutchess communities across the river, including the cities of Poughkeepsie and Beacon.

I urge the Independent Redistricting Commission to honor the common interests and multiple connections among these Hudson river communities

by proposed redistricting maps that unify these citizens' Congressional representation in a single district. Democracy demands that the Mid-Hudson river communities on both sides of the Hudson River be part of a single Congressional district.

My wife and I work with a group of citizens who live between Albany and Poughkeepsie. The Mid Hudson Valley is our home. This place has been in New York's 19th Congressional district for the last ten years. We know the district will change, but we want the Redistricting Commission to recognize our distinctive region with its cultural institutions, local agriculture, and our historic ex-urban character.

Agriculture: Some of us farm and all of us love what we get from our local farms. We care about local agriculture and believe that our agriculture, while mostly made up of small farms, is innovative, and leads the nation in "biodynamic" methods. And, because we have major population centers nearby we have many teaching farms like Katchkie Farm in Kinderhook and Churchtown Dairy near Hudson. In these and other respects, our farmers are our neighbors. We want their food in our schools and we love living surrounded by these sources of life.

Cultural/Historical. The Mid Hudson Valley is a particularly rich cultural environment. It is the center of the first great American art movement, the Hudson River School. Thomas Cole started it in Catskill and Frederick Church developed it beautifully across the river. These and other artists have treasured the distinctive character of our region while making it an important tourist destination. The region has been home to stately residences of notable New Yorkers such as Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt and our only non native English speaking President, Martin Van Buren. Culture and history abounds from Woodstock and the Catskills on one side of the river to Edna St. Vincent Millay's Steepletop and Bard College on the other. Bard marks the center of our region while RPI, Vassar and Marist anchor the borders to the North and South.

Ex/Mini Urban: We are a land of small, largely owner operated businesses, that is close to countryside, the mountains, and our magnificent river. Hence, as you will understand well, we are, geographically, a large district. And, we are aware that neither our art nor our farms would exist as they do without proximity to the city, but we are not "the City." We have small urban areas. Their character is different from the cities and suburbs to our North and South. This is because our cities are small, distinctive, and close to the land.

So, we are not in or of the "Capital District," though in the North we can see its spires. And, we are not a suburb of New York City, though in the South, the suburbs are not far away. As our life since the pandemic shows, we are a distinctive place of towns between the City and the North Country and we do not want to be overwhelmed by the vastness that threatens our distinctive character.

I recall when I was a member of the State Assembly we were faced with the possibility of dividing Yonkers into several Assembly districts such that there would not be a single district wholly contained within the City. With the help of many members, including some of those receiving this message now, we succeeded in rejecting that plan in favor of one that kept at least one district wholly within the City. We believed it was essential that the City would have at least one representative who would represent the interests of the City only, and that the City's voice would not be diminished.

Now, as you consider Congressional redistricting, the same can be said for Westchester County. There should be at least one Congressional District that is wholly within the borders of Westchester County. New York City has many members who represent portions of that City, and that City only. #### Dear New York State Independent Redistricting Commission:

I have the honor of serving as the Executive of Ulster County, a place that my family has called home for five generations. I am writing to you today to discuss the county in relation redistricting. As you are aware, the New York State Legislature voted on January 10<sup>th</sup> to reject the redistricting maps as proposed by the commission. I am deeply concerned about the prospect of Ulster County being split between Congressional Districts as proposed in your previous drafts.

Since 1840, Ulster County has remained in a single Congressional District in all but one round of redistricting. Undoubtedly, this has consistently happened because previous State Legislatures and State Courts have acknowledged the uniqueness and interconnectedness of the community and the importance of it remaining within a single district.

Splitting Ulster County, which has consistently and clearly been identified as a community of interest, would have a multitude of negative impacts in representation, drawing arbitrary and harmful divisions between communities that currently share school districts, businesses and economic zones, water and sewer districts, fire and emergency services, roads and other infrastructure, drinking water, and much more.

I am particularly concerned that our critical efforts to recover and rebuild after the COVID-19 pandemic will be negatively impacted if the county were to be split across districts. For example, we have finalized plans to utilize \$34 million in federal relief funds that were allocated directly to the county, enabling us to rebuild our economy, provide quality housing for all residents, and address major gaps in our mental health and addiction recovery systems. The federal government's decision to provide these funds directly to the county further reinforces the centrality of the county as an important and single community of interest. Splitting Ulster County across two districts would clearly undercut and harm these efforts.

This dynamic is similar across a myriad of vital programs and services — many of them fully or partially federally-funded — that are administered at the county level. Splitting the county across multiple Congressional Districts would negatively impact the quality and accessibility of a wide range of services for hundreds of thousands of people, from healthcare (e.g. Medicaid) to workforce development (e.g. WIOA programs) to housing and economic development (e.g. CDBG). In particular, the proposal to split Kingston and Ellenville — the two municipalities in

the county with the highest proportion of Black and Latino residents, and also the highest levels of poverty — would significantly harm our coordinated efforts to serve these often underrepresented and underserved communities.

In addition, I am very concerned about the prospect of splitting the Hudson River towns on both sides of the river (especially the river towns in Ulster and Dutchess counties), which have a centuries-long tradition of connectivity and unique characteristics that require unified representation. From our shared economies and universities, to the two major bridges (and the Walkway Over the Hudson) directly linking the counties, to the "Hudson 7" communities that collectively draw drinking water for more than 100,000 people from the Hudson River, these towns clearly constitute a community of interest.

In summary, any future Congressional Districts must maintain the integrity of the community of interest in Ulster County, and must make every effort to also incorporate the river towns on the eastern side of the Hudson River in Dutchess County. Dividing Kingston from Esopus, Highland from Poughkeepsie, and Ellenville from Rochester would ignore the clear reality on the ground in the everyday lives of residents, have negative impacts on the quality of service delivery for hundreds of thousands of people in the region, and run contrary to our democratic principles of fair and equal representation.



• **Body**: Now that the Commission has failed to propose a single set of maps endorsed by the requisite majority of its members, the New York State Legislature is likely to reject the Commission's first proposals. As a concerned resident of Westchester County, I urge you to recognize the importance of maintaining Westchester's independent voice and not having it split apart and diluted by surrounding areas of New York City. The City of New York is a unique urban center with an infrastructure of its own, like none other in the state, and a set of issues and concerns that are wholly distinct from suburban communities like Westchester. If the Commission is given the opportunity to propose a second set of maps, it should use that opportunity to unite areas of Westchester County. It appears that both maps under consideration would continue to artificially link portions of the north Bronx with portions of Westchester in one district, while drawing another district that would link Westchester with portions of both the Bronx and Queen's. These maps are fundamentally flawed because they dilute the voice of both the suburban community in Westchester (and Putnam counties) and the New York City community in the Bronx and Queens. The district linking Westchester with both the Bronx and Queens is particularly unfair and unacceptable because it divides communities in three counties, limiting the ability of residents in each part of the district to have an elected official who can effectively represent their interests.

During last year's public hearings, when residents of New Rochelle testified before the Independent Redistricting Commission, several were asked by Commissioners whether they would want a district connecting New Rochelle to Queens. None said yes, yet the Commission still drew a Queens to New Rochelle district in both of its proposals. Rather than having District 14 be contained entirely in New York City and District 16 be the only district to cross the Westchester/Bronx border, as was proposed in the earlier Names and Letters draft plans, the Commission inexplicably decided to cross the county border. twice. This decision divides communities throughout the region and would especially dilute the voice of the community of southern Westchester centered around Scarsdale and northern New Rochelle. This area has shared infrastructure and institutions, and both proposals would split this community into not two but three different Congressional Districts. When the lines were last redrawn, New Rochelle, Scarsdale and other parts of Westchester were joined with the Bronx. Now, ten years later, the Commission's proposals would further dilute Westchester's voice. # Comments on Congressional Maps in Southern Westchester/Sound Shore - Jan 15, 2021

- The proposed maps split both the Village and Town of Mamaroneck into two pieces. As a resident of the Town of Mamaroneck, under the current proposal I would be separated from my Town and stuck in the no-mans-land that connects the Northern Sound Shore with Yonkers. The shape of this map is a telltale sign of gerrymandering and violates the Commission's stated principle of keeping communities of interest and municipalities together.
- The division of the Sound Shore community into two pieces will make it extremely difficult to get attention for Sound Shore environmental and other concerns because of the divided attention of two representatives instead of one, and the smaller portion we will represent in the district of each.
- The map also splits off 4 communities (Larchmont, Mamaroneck, Pelham and a sizable part of New Rochelle) into a district with the Bronx and Queens and separate from Westchester County. This virtually ensures that the needs of the small Westchester portion of the district will not be met. Westchester and NYC have more differences than similarities (schools, transportation,government), including in those communities, and that's why my earlier testimony to the Commission included a request that the two regions be kept separate.
- Westchester County would be divided among 3 districts instead of two, which will fracture the attention of our reps and reduce the political clout of our county in D.C.

Please redraw this portion of the maps to do the following:

- Keep Larchmont/Mamaroneck together, including Town and Villages
- Keep the Sound Shore together especially for environmental reasons
- Keep our small Sound Shore communities separate from a huge NYC area where we will get little attention
- Reduce the number of Westchester districts to 2 not 3

Dear Chairman Imamura, Vice Chairman Martins, Members of the Commission, and Co-Executive Directors Blatt and Breakell,

I am writing to you today to share Scenic Hudson's perspective on the recently proposed Congressional District and State Legislative maps drafted by the New York State Independent Redistricting Commission. As you are aware, there are active discussion that propose reorganization of the electoral map in the Hudson Valley.

Scenic Hudson preserves land and farms and creates parks that connect people with the inspirational power of the Hudson River, while fighting threats to the river and climate change. Our work brings together people and organizations to protect the natural resources at the heart of the Hudson Valley's health and prosperity. Founded in 1963, we are the largest environmental organization addressing the needs of our region.

The Hudson Valley is home to several major social and ecological communities that share unique identities and are worthy of consistent, focused attention by US Congress and the NY State Legislature. Scenic Hudson is concerned by proposals that would unduly complicate representation and management of the region's environment and natural resource based economy, and challenge our collective ability to address climate change and organize federal and state support to help achieve the goals of New York State's Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act, including its environmental justice policy.

Scenic Hudson strongly recommends that the current Congressional Districts NY-20, NY-19, NY-18, and NY-17, generally speaking, be drawn in a manner to retain most of the communities that they currently represent. We believe that there is a special case to be made for why Ulster County should remain in a single Congressional District. We further propose, as we have in previous redistricting efforts, that districts throughout the region cross the Hudson River to ensure that our waterfront community's identities continue to be recognized for the critical role they play in New York's environment and our Nation's economy.

#### **NY Congressional District 20**

The ecological character of the current NY-20 Congressional District is defined by the confluence of the upper Hudson and Mohawk Rivers with the Hudson River Estuary. This region is united by unique challenges, including reversing harm from decades of damage caused by water management infrastructure that opened new opportunities for our nation's commerce, yet

is now increasingly being understood as contributing to invasive species management challenges and flooding of local communities, including state-mapped Environmental Justice Areas. Uniform representation of this area of the Hudson Valley is essential to address these and other issues.

#### **NY Congressional District 19**

The Catskills, Hudson Valley and Taconic region – notably Ulster County and waterfront communities in Columbia and Dutchess Counties – share unique environmental challenges that must be represented uniformly in Congress. These issues include species and habitat migration due to climate change, flood control, sea level rise adaptation in coastal communities, and drinking water infrastructure for New York City. In addition, the region has a robust agricultural economy that defines the rural landscape. Farms in this region, on average, are less than half the acreage of the state's average size farm, trend towards producing specialized products for the New York City market, and include a great number of farmers that are employing climate resilient and regenerative techniques.

Ulster County, in particular, is at the forefront of these issues, and it must not be bifurcated on future Congressional maps. Further, its social and economic connectivity with Columbia and Dutchess County waterfront communities, made possible by the Rip Van Winkle, Kingston-Rhinecliff, and Mid-Hudson Bridges would benefit from uniform representation. This area of the Hudson River has been significantly impacted by generations of industrialization. As a result, it contains many opportunities to reduce harmful chemical contaminants such as PCBs, restore critical habitats, promote equitable public access to the Hudson River, and implement local plans for sea level rise and climate resilience. The Cities of Hudson, Kingston and other population centers are also home to many frontline communities mapped as Environmental Justice Areas by New York State. Focused attention on these disadvantaged communities is necessary to unlock their potential and created new opportunities for their residents to address social justice and economic development issues.

Because of the connectivity of these issues and the region's unique demographics, Scenic Hudson strongly recommends that Ulster County be contained wholly within its future Congressional District, and that the district also include other waterfront communities in Dutchess and Columbia Counties.

### NY Congressional District 18 and overlapping State Senate Districts

The current Congressional District is defined by the Hudson Highlands, the portion of the Appalachian Mountain chain that runs through New York State. The region has been extensively studied by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and is home to nationally significant watersheds, wildlife habitats, and farmland and forest systems. These natural resources are recognized for their federal significance in the Highlands Conservation Act. From an environmental prospective, the ability of the Hudson Valley and its Hudson Highlands sub-region to continue to provide clean water benefits to the Croton Aqueduct system and recreational opportunities for the regions residents and visitors from New York City, requires consistent and uniform representation in Congress.

We apply this same logic to current State Senate District 39, and request that it be redrawn to

include the Hudson Highlands, a major natural resource of interest to the State of New York that is included in the State Open Space Conservation Plan. It is also the proposed site of state and nationally significant infrastructure and public access amenities, including the Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail, and the Appalachian Trail. Analogous to our analysis of the 19<sup>th</sup> Congressional District, the Cities of Beacon and Newburgh share much in common, and a strong economic and social connection through the Newburgh-Beacon Bridge, a ferry service, waterfront parks, and the challenges and opportunities faced by small cities in the region. As such, they would benefit by representation in the same State Senate District.

#### NY Congressional Districts 17 and 16

The suburban areas of Westchester and Rockland Counties are united by their proximity to the Hudson River and major transportation infrastructure, including the Tappan Zee Bridge/Mario Cuomo Bridge, a critical connection for commerce, motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians. In this region, Scenic Hudson believes that Congressional maps must be drawn to further position the Hudson as an economic and environmental resource that attracts new visitors and facilitates the recovery of natural resources by federal agencies. Management of oyster reefs and habitat for other critical water-dependent species, through dam removal, daylighting of historically buried tributaries, and other means, and managing sea level rise and flooding in these waterfront and near-shore communities, requires coordinated federal action and uniform representation in Congress. These initiatives will benefit from stronger representation if future Congressional Districts cross the river between the two counties.

#### Conclusion

As history has demonstrated, the Hudson Valley, because of its geography and rich environmental resources, will continue to be influential to New York State's and our Nation's prosperity. The economy and environment are closely linked in this region, and it is critical that future Congressional maps represent this connectivity and prioritize it to ensure that the region's communities receive sufficient Congressional attention to secure this promise.

I am a long-time member of Community Board 8 Manhattan and a resident of the Upper East Side. Isaacs and Holmes are part of our community and should be part of our Congressional district.

As a longtime member of Community Board 8 and an involved member of the community, I have worked with residents of Isaacs and Holmes on the effort to expand and improve the East River Esplanade, and other issues. Community Board 8 has identified parks and open space as one of our top three most pressing issues for Fiscal Year 2022. Greenery and public space are critical to our quality of life and our health, but Community Board 8's aging parks are in particularly poor repair. The proposed maps split both the Village and Town of Mamaroneck into two pieces. [As a resident of the Town of Mamaroneck, under the current proposal I would be separated from my Town and stuck in the no-mans-land that connects the Northern Sound Shore with Yonkers.] The shape of this map is a telltale sign of gerrymandering and violates the Commission's stated principle of keeping communities of interest and municipalities together.

The division of the Sound Shore community into two pieces will make it extremely difficult to get attention for Sound Shore environmental and other concerns because of the divided attention of two representatives instead of one, and the smaller portion we will represent in the district of each.

The map also splits off 4 communities (Larchmont, Mamaroneck, Pelham and a sizable part of New Rochelle) into a district with the Bronx and Queens and separate from Westchester County. This virtually ensures that the needs of the small Westchester portion of the district will not be met. Westchester and NYC have more differences than similarities (schools, transportation,government), including in those communities, and that's why my earlier testimony to the Commission included a request that the two regions be kept separate.

Westchester County would be divided among 3 districts instead of two, which will fracture the attention of our reps and reduce the political clout of our county in D.C.

Please redraw this portion of the maps to do the following:

Dear Chair, Vice-Chair and Honorable Commissioners:

Thank you for the opportunity to participate in your process of obtaining public input on the redistricting plans for New York State. We ask that this correspondence be made part of the official record.

The currently proposed congressional redistricting plan splits the Town of Mamaroneck and the Village of Mamaroneck into two separate congressional districts (NY14 and NY16), and separates the Sound Shore communities who have long shared congressional representation.

The Town of Mamaroneck, Village of Mamaroneck and Village of Larchmont are joined in their opposition to the proposed congressional redistricting plan for our municipalities.

It is important not only to understand the close working relationship and governmental interconnectedness that exists within our tri-municipal boundaries, but the fact that all of the Village of Larchmont and the majority of the Village of Mamaroneck lie within the Town of Mamaroneck. The Town of Mamaroneck and the Villages of Larchmont and Mamaroneck have a long history of sharing municipal services, such as EMS, library, community counseling, sanitation, recreation, capital improvement contracts and equipment, as well as sharing a school district. We hold regular quarterly meetings to discuss local issues and plan for joint solutions. We have often presented our shared needs to our congressional representatives as a tri-municipal entity in order to best represent our constituents and secure federal support.

Our primary concern with the proposed plan is the separation into two congressional districts. This partitioning of both the Town of Mamaroneck and the Village of Mamaroneck into two districts will make it more difficult for local officials to interface with the federal government to meet the needs of our constituents, it dilutes our voices and makes it harder to get attention for the issues that matter specifically to our community, such as flooding. It will also create confusion among our residents when seeking constituent services.

Secondarily, since the Town and both Villages are within the Long Island watershed, all of our stormwater flows into Long Island Sound, and our sanitary sewers flow into either the New Rochelle or Mamaroneck Valley treatment plants. Separating the Sound Shore communities into two congressional districts would undercut potential regional solutions and inter-municipal cooperative agreements to comprehensively address stormwater and sanitary sewer issues and regional flooding. These common interests and the need to work together to address shared environmental matters that impact the Long Island Sound mean that, to be successful, all such joint efforts often involve federal monies and common representation.

In summation, the proposal disregards the common goals, shared identity and long-standing collaborative efforts in many areas of mutual concern among the Town of Mamaroneck and Villages of Mamaroneck and Larchmont. It also disregards the areas of mutual concern for the municipalities of the Sound Shore District. All of the Sound Shore communities deserve to have a single voice to represent their collective, unique and mutual interests.

The Town of Mamaroneck, Village of Mamaroneck, and Village of Larchmont therefore strongly oppose the proposed change in the boundaries of the 16<sup>th</sup> Congressional District and urge the Commission to reconsider such proposal.

To the members of the Independent Redistricting Commission,

I am Chair of Community Board 8 Manhattan, which stretches from East 96th Street to East 59th Street, from Fifth Avenue to the East River, as well as Roosevelt Island, and includes Stanley M. Isaacs Houses and Holmes Towers. The residents of Isaacs and Holmes are part of our community and have similar concerns to the rest of the Community Board. Isaacs and Holmes are located between First Avenue and the East River, between 92nd and 96th Street. While Plan B keeps Isaacs and Holmes in the 12th Congressional district, as it currently is, Plan A cuts it out of the district.

The Isaacs and Holmes complex includes a popular senior center, the Stanley Isaacs Center, that is attended by seniors from all over the Upper East Side, not just residents of Isaacs and Holmes. Issues related to the senior center, which receives a significant amount of its funding from the federal government, are of concern to the entire community, not just residents of Isaacs and Holmes. It makes sense to have one member of Congress to represent the senior center, Isaacs and Holmes residents, and the non-resident seniors who use the facility.

Children who live in Isaacs and Holmes attend Community School District 2 schools which are located in our community district. When our local schools were overcrowded, all District 2 children were impacted, including residents of Isaacs and Holmes. One of the reasons for the overcrowding is that a public school on East 91st Street had been closed and no new school had been created to replace it. Instead, children from the area were sent to adjacent District 2 schools, causing all of them to become overcrowded. Our member of Congress formed a task force that led to the creation of a new school in the neighborhood, PS 151, which helped alleviate the overcrowding.

When the city proposed to build a giant private apartment building on Holmes's property, the entire neighborhood joined with residents of Holmes and Isaacs to protest the action. We marched together, went to meetings together and stood together in opposition to the idea that taking property from public housing tenants was a good way to solve underfunding of NYCHA. We pointed out that the amount of

money the city would receive would in no way come close to solving the deficit. Our member of Congress was among the elected officials representing our neighborhood who led this effort.

When the city proposed building a large marine transfer station adjacent to Holmes and Isaacs, residents joined the effort to try to defeat it. They worked in coalition with residents throughout our community district. Some looked at the community district at large and said that it was environmental justice to build the marine transfer station next to Isaacs and Holmes. Our member of Congress pointed out that the structure was being built next to a public housing development and said that it was just as wrong to burden the public housing residents who lived in our community district as those who lived in other community districts. Residents of Isaacs and Holmes should have a member of Congress who understands the nuances of the neighborhood.

If you divide Isaacs and Holmes from the community board in which they live, they will no longer have a member of Congress who has an interest in understanding the neighborhood issues that affect all of us in this community district. Moreover, it would suggest that public housing residents are not full and equal members of our neighborhood—that they are distinct and should be considered separate. I reject any such separation. Isaacs and Holmes residents are Upper East Siders and part of our neighborhood and should be in our Congressional district. Accordingly, I urge you to adopt district lines that keep Isaacs and Holmes with the rest of the Community Board.

The most recent map cut us off from the rest of the Upper East Side community, removing us from the 12th congressional district.

As an active community member and organizer, I understand the value of having the same Congressional Representative as our neighbors. Stanley M. Isaacs Houses and Holmes Towers share a community board, police precinct, and school district with our neighbors on the Upper East Side and we should share a Congressional district too. Working with this broader community to advocate for issues important to us has been incredibly important.

We have worked in partnership with other Upper East Siders on issues that are critical to our community, including the fight against the Marine Transfer Station, the drive to build a Second Avenue Subway, and the coalition to improve the East River Esplanade. The present 35<sup>th</sup> Assembly District has African American communities in North Corona, East Elmhurst, LeFrak City and Sherwood Apartments that has enabled an Assembly Member to go to Albany and make legislative appropriations that address social inequities that manifest in drug abuse, allow for the creation and maintenance of a growing senior citizen population, and create programming support for youth betterment through sport and job training.

There is also a strong connection with these communities and LaGuardia Airport where opportunities have always been present for franchise ownership serving the unending stream of passengers passing through, and for service contracts in the airport facility.

Presently, issues around automobile traffic (with its resultant congestion and pollution) and alternative means of transportation to and from this upgraded airport are being debated. Obviously, this State issue has a major impact on the surrounding community's quality of life.

In addition, cultural institutions in Flushing Meadows-Corona Park have historically been a part of this district as these two communities are connected both geographically and through local usage of these important areas.

The proposed new Assembly District lines take the 10,000+ residents in North Corona and East Elmhurst and put them in a newly created 34th Assembly District. It takes the 2,500+ residents of Lefrak City and Sherwood Apartments and puts them in the newly created 39th Assembly District. Neither of the two new ADs have residents with the same number of ethnicities that would empower either community as one would be overwhelming Hispanic, while the other White, Orthodox Jewish (Russian ancestry), North Asian and Indian (south Asia).

Any new legislative lines drawn pursuant to the 2020 Census, must take these factors into account before any map is finalized. The African American communities of North Corona, East Elmhurst, LeFrak City and Sherwood Apartments must be kept together in a unified Assembly District.

The proposed maps split both the Village and Town of Mamaroneck into two pieces. As a resident of the Town of Mamaroneck, under the current proposal I would be separated from my Town and stuck in the no-mans-land that connects the Northern Sound Shore with Yonkers. The shape of this map is a telltale sign of gerrymandering and violates the Commission's stated principle of keeping communities of interest and municipalities together.

The division of the Sound Shore community into two pieces will make it extremely difficult to get attention for Sound Shore environmental and other concerns because of the divided attention of two representatives instead of one, and the smaller portion we will represent in the district of each.

The map also splits off 4 communities (Larchmont, Mamaroneck, Pelham and a sizable part of New Rochelle) into a district with the Bronx and Queens and separate from Westchester County. This virtually ensures that the needs of the small Westchester portion of the district will not be met. Westchester and NYC have more differences than similarities (schools, transportation,government), including in those communities. As it stands now (before redistricting), we often feel unrepresented given the district focus in the Bronx, with different needs and concerns than ours.

Westchester County would be divided among 3 districts instead of two, which will fracture the attention of our reps and reduce the political clout of our county in D.C.

It was an honor to testify before your commission last August. I know that in the Buffalo-Niagara region, much of the attention was focused in a few areas:

- 1. Strong opposition to any re-establishment of a district connecting any municipality within the Buffalo/Niagara Region to the city of Rochester and/or its surrounding communities (known in its 2003-2012 iteration as the "Earmuff" district); and
- 2. Strong support for the city of Buffalo to remain united in one single congressional district along with immediately surrounding suburban communities; and
- 3. Strong support for Niagara Falls to remain included within a district with the city of Buffalo.

I would like to offer my sincere thanks to commission members for addressing our community's concerns. Despite not reaching agreement on a single set of maps, commissioners from both political parties proposed a map for the 26<sup>th</sup> Congressional District which met the above criteria.

As you know, the best congressional districts are compact and contiguous, combining residents of shared interests and communities of concern. The maps released on January 3, 2022 for the 26th Congressional District do an excellent job of meeting these criteria. Moreover, these districts, by maintaining inclusion of the city of Niagara Falls as well as the entirety of the cities of Buffalo and Lackawanna along with other first-ring Buffalo suburbs, ensure the maximum voting strength of persons of color.

Following this week's rejection of the January 3 maps by the State Legislature, we know that your commission will have another opportunity to draw maps for further legislative consideration. We, the New York Latino Civic Engagement Coalition, are writing to express our deep concern with the status of New York's redistricting process and the New York State Independent Redistricting Commission's inability to reach consensus on a single set of maps for consideration by the New York State Legislature. In 2014, New Yorkers overwhelmingly voted to establish the Commission, which created an opportunity to remove the state's redistricting process from the influence of partisan maneuverings that often led to maps that were not fair for all New Yorkers, including Latinos. The current redistricting cycle serves as an important opportunity for New Yorkers to have a meaningful voice in the line-drawing process. As the Commission and the Legislature navigate the process during the upcoming weeks, we continue to advocate for a process that is transparent, responsive to community input, and produces maps that provide New York's under-represented communities with a fair opportunity to elect the candidates of their choice.

As civic engagement organizations focused on protecting the rights of New York's Latino communities, we actively engaged community members in the Commission's redistricting process and mobilized them to provide public comment during the commission's summer and fall hearings. We invested in mobilizing community members to participate in the process because we saw it as a true opportunity for our community's voices to be heard and reflected. We also believe that the Commission's maps must reflect the significant growth of the state's Latino community. The percentage of New York State's Latinos increased from 17.6% in 2010 to 19.5% in 2020; nearly one in five New Yorkers are Latino. In New York State, Latinos accounted for nearly two-thirds (64.5%) of the population growth between 2010 and 2020, and Latinos now comprise 28% of New York City's total population. To ensure the success of the independent redistricting process – a process that should empower community voices and reflect

• **Body**: The fact that you do not even have a "Location" category that fits where we live illustrates the problem with the proposed district map.

For 10 years my wife and I have lived (and we still live) in postal Larchmont but in the Town of Mamaroneck in the Sound Shore portion of Westchester County. We previously lived, with our children, for 40 years, in the Village of Larchmont, all of which itself is part of the Town of Mamaroneck. Furthermore, the Town of Mamaronck also includes about 2/3 of the Village of Mamaroneck. None of us live in The Bronx (although my wife grew up there, and I went to college there, both many decades ago), and our problems are typically not closely related to the problems faced by many residents of The Bronx. I have served on various Village of Larchmont and Town of Mamaroneck boards and committees for over 35 years, and, for the last 5, I have headed the Town of Mamaroneck's Planning Board. Accordingly, I am very familiar with how things work around here. The main point is that the entire Town of Mamaroneck, including the entire Village of Larchmont and the entire Village of Mamaroneck, even the 1/3 of that Village that is not in the Town of Mamaroneck, are effectively governed as one coordinated area, and the entire population of all three should remain in one and the same Congressional (as well as Assembly and Senate) district.

Furthermore, we should be in governmental districts the residents of which have problems similar to ours, which would involve most of Westchester, but not most of The Bronx, so that we may be properly represented at all levels of government, just



Relative to my earlier upstate redistricting, this also has some other changes that bring the populations in each district closer to equal, without ever dividing any of the 49 smaller counties in the state (those smaller than the standard Senate district size). The maximum deviation from this standard size is 5.5%



Whatever the need may be, to divide large counties among multiple legislative districts in order to keep them nearly equal in size, this need is not present for smaller Upstate counties. This map is a mathematic proof of this, showing that it is possible to keep every county, city, and town with a population under 320,655 undivided, and almost all villages, without skirting any of the other Constitutional criteria the IRC must follow.

There are 40 State Senate districts in the "Plan A" proposal submitted by the Independent Redistricting Commission that reach through the middle of Westchester County (numbered 1-37,39, and 40). These have a combined population of 12,519,302. There is no attempt here to re-define the boundaries of any of these "40 Downstate Plan A districts." The remainder of Upstate NY has a 2020 population of 7,681,947. This corresponds to 23.957 times the average Senate district size (320,655, or 1/63 of the state's population). The Upstate Senate Districting plan here defines 24 State Senate districts for this Upstate population.

North of Westchester, there are only 5 Upstate counties with populations entitling them to over one full State Senate district: Erie (almost exactly 3 full districts); Monroe (2.37); Onondaga (1.486); Orange (1.25), and Rockland (1.05). All the remaining 50 counties have fewer than 320,655 inhabitants in the 2020 census. If, as the NY Constitution mandates, Onondaga and Orange Counties were each left undivided as a single Senate district, or if Monroe County were divided into 2 equal districts, this would result in a district over 18% larger than the standard district size. These deviations appear to me likely to be violations of the "one-man, one-vote" principle laid out in Reynolds v. Sims. That is, this landmark court ruling might be used to justify the division of these 3 counties—but in my opinion, no more.

The district map below shows that by dividing only Monroe, Onondaga, and Orange, it is possible to avoid population imbalances greater than 5.5% above or 5.1% below ideal. The district with the most is Rockland County by itself. There is no good justification for dividing it; 105.5% of average is hardly an outrageous deviation. The ratio of the populations of the largest and smallest districts in this map is 338,329/304,427 or 1.111. A mere 11% discrepancy between largest and smallest populations in State Senate districts is not a self-evident violation of one-man, one-vote principle as elaborated in a US Supreme Court decision (Reynolds v. Sims).

The districting below furthermore divides *no Upstate city or town*. None of these has a population greater than 320,655. This is important for creating Senate districts with nonwhite majorities in Syracuse, Rochester, and Buffalo. On the other hand, the need to create such districts where possible is a justification for dividing Monroe and Onondaga counties: It better allows groups that have traditionally experienced voting-rights discrimination to gain fair representation in the NY Senate.

There are a few remaining features of this districting map that are slightly concerning, but unavoidable if counties are not to be divided unnecessarily:

- 1) The "excess populations" of Monroe, Onondaga, and Orange counties (over their populations that form integer numbers of districts) are each divided among 3, 3, and 2 neighboring Senate districts, respectively, rather than just 1 each. This means that the Boards of Elections in these 3 counties must each track 1 or 2 more State Senate races than the minimum necessary; and voters' identities in these 3 counties are divided more than the minimum necessary to achieve equal-sized districts. So far, I have not found an Upstate Senate districting map that reduces this problem further, without also leading to significantly more unequal district sizes.
- 2) District 63, which contains the whole of Buffalo, plus the towns of Lackawanna and Grand Island, stretches to the limit the definition of "contiguous". However, any town consisting of a single island is, by any strict definition, non-contiguous with any other jurisdiction. The only jurisdictions in Erie County that are "more" contiguous with Grand Island than Buffalo would be Tonawanda Town and Tonawanda City. I could not come up with an equal 3-way division of Erie County that keeps the City of Buffalo intact in a single district, and that also groups Grand Island with either of the Tonawanda jurisdictions. If one is found, I would consider it superior to the district map below.
- 3) District 43 consists of Dutchess County plus 2 appropriately sized towns in Orange County, that are across the Hudson River. The shape of this "tab" in District 43 is less compact than desirable. However, Dutchess County is just a bit too small for a single Senate district. Shifting these 2 towns from Orange County equalizes the population of districts 42 and 43 as no other "more-compact" shifts between these 2 districts can.
- 4) Several of the other districts (49, 53, 54, 55, 59) are also less compact than desirable. However, these shapes are necessary in order to allow compliance with the NY Constitution while keeping district sizes within ±5.5% of ideal.

#### **Overview**

New York is a diverse and vibrant state that has been badly served for the last decade by a map that fails to group like communities together and therefore dilutes the voices of New Yorkers in Congress. The legislature should take action to bring folks with similar needs throughout the state together and correct the errors of the past.

In New York City and the surrounding areas, the current map does a serviceable job ensuring that communities are linked together and that minority representation is strong - as the New York State constitution requires. Of course, communities have changed over the past decade and the new map should reflect that. Ultimately, although lines may shift or expand, the districts must preserve the ability of minority communities to elect their chosen representatives to Congress. Groups like the Unity Coalition have suggested maps that adhere to the state constitutional requirement that maps shall not abridge the voting rights of racial or language minorities. We have used their suggestions below to preserve minority opportunity districts while adding to their work on Long Island where there is a clear opportunity for a new majority-minority district.

Although New York State is home to America's most populous city, it is also home to dozens of mid-sized and small cities. These cities are vibrant centers of culture and education and are often the engines driving regional economic growth. But, like many other urban areas around the country, they have unique challenges, with crumbling infrastructure, high rates of crime, addiction, and poverty. These communities need representation in Congress that understands both their struggles and opportunities and is willing to fight for the tools they need to reach their full potential. Meanwhile, the state's rural and agricultural communities are often set at odds with the needs of the urban and suburban communities – meaning no one is getting the advocacy they deserve.

In correcting these imbalances, the New York Legislature must also deal with some hard facts. New York is losing a seat because it did not grow as fast as other states in the past 10 years, adding only 823k people. The population growth was not evenly distributed, with nearly all of it (+828k) occurring in the 12 "downstate"

counties from Mid-Hudson through Long Island. Meanwhile, all but 11 of the 50 upstate counties lost population. Within those counties, there was also a shift toward urban and suburban centers – for example, the city of Syracuse grew for the first time in 70 years, while the populations of surrounding upstate communities decreased dramatically.

#### Western New York, the Finger Lakes, and the Western Southern Tier

For generations, the population centers of Western New York and the Finger Lakes region have clustered around four predominant water features – Lake Erie, Lake Ontario, the Niagara River, and the Erie Canal. The cities and towns that grew up along the water are certainly the largest in the region and larger than nearly every other city outside of the New York City media market.

In fact, these communities, from the biggest cities of Buffalo and Rochester, to the smaller towns like Greece, Tonawanda, Niagara Falls, and Lackawanna are too big for a single congressional district. There should be two seats to represent these lakefront communities.

#### **New York's 26th Congressional District:**

The first should follow the lake from just north of Silver Creek up through the northern border of Buffalo city, and include the Buffalo suburbs Eggertsville, Cheektowaga, Harris Hill Clarence, West Seneca, Lackawanna, and the southwest lake communities of East Aurora, North Boston, and Lake Erie Beach. This compact, metro Buffalo district is a clear and obvious community of interest.

#### **New York's 25th Congressional District:**

The second district should reunite the old Erie Canal towns of Rochester and Tonawanda with the industrial and tourism communities along Lake Ontario and the Niagara River, drawing in the City of Rochester, and the Monroe County towns of Irondequoit, Clarkson, Brockport, Hamlin, while heading north and west along the lake to Lockport, and then over to Niagara Falls, and the aforementioned towns of Tonawanda and North Tonawanda. This district would resemble the previous iteration of the congressional maps before the 2012 redraw, which recognized the urban centers of these lakefront communities have shared communities and needs.

#### New York's 23rd & 27th Congressional Districts:

Due in part to similar planting hardiness zones and soil composition, the agricultural industries of Chautauqua, Wyoming, Genesee, Livingston, Allegany, Schuyler, and Steuben Counties generate billions of dollars in annual revenue. These breadbasket communities are dominated by farmland, producing dairy, grains, hay, corn, and

other specialty vegetables and fruits. Along with Seneca and Yates Counties, these counties are leaders in New York State's hog, pig, sheep, cattle, and calf production. This region also claims some of New York's biggest grape and wine producers. It is also home to some of the largest swaths of public and private forestland and hunting grounds, centered in the Pennsylvania border communities of Allegany, Cattaraugus, Steuben and western Chemung Counties. These counties are also very sparsely populated, with only two or three cities like Batavia and Bath claiming more than ten thousand residents.

Ideally, all of these communities would be joined together in one district, so their representative in Congress can be laser focused on their issues.

This more rural district could include the outer suburban and exurban areas as well as the farmland and forested areas of Orleans, Niagara, and Monroe Counties to unite agricultural interests. These areas would add to the agricultural profile of this combined district, picking up some of the most important fruit and horticultural producers in New York State and making this single district responsible for roughly 1/3rd of the state's agricultural sales.

# Central New York, Eastern Southern Tier, and the Mohawk Valley:

This region of the state is often the hardest to classify. Looking at dozens of organizational maps, from NYISO, Empire State Development regions, the SUNY system, statewide nonprofits, and even high school sports leagues one can see quickly that unlike the Hudson Valley or the North Country, regional boundaries here are not always clear. A new map should not be solely bound to these old classifications, but again seek to join similar small and mid-sized cities to unite New Yorkers in this region who have similar interests.

# New York's 24th Congressional District:

As noted above, the city of Syracuse, in Onondaga County, has grown in the last decade, for the first time in 70 years. At the same time, the four counties surrounding Onondaga County all lost population: Cayuga (-4.7 percent), Oswego (-3.8 percent), Madison (-7.4 percent) and Cortland (-5.1 percent). This population loss means that the current mapping configurations must change. The Central New York seat, now known as the 24th, should ideally tie together similar urban and suburban communities. These communities are more diverse than the surrounding areas and share many important educational institutions like SUNY Geneseo, SUNY Oswego, and Syracuse University. To unite these communities of interest, this district should have a westernmost edge starting at the Irondequoit Bay. The district should then extend east along the Lake Ontario shoreline to Oswego County, and then follow down the Oswego River to Onondaga Lake and the city of Syracuse.

The district should also cross over the top of the Finger Lakes, uniting the tourism industries of the lakeside cities and towns of Skaneateles, Auburn, Seneca Falls, Geneva, and Canandaigua. The district would also include Geneseo and the SUNY Geneseo campus.

### **New York's 22nd Congressional District:**

The cities of the eastern Southern Tier region, the Mohawk Valley, and the Central Leatherstocking region should also be united to form a district stretching from the eastern Syracuse suburbs up the river to Oneida Lake. This district, which would roughly take the place of the current 22<sup>nd</sup> district, would contain these communities, which are driven by the manufacturing and logistics industries, along with the professional support services that accompany these economies. In the outlying communities, retail, agriculture, and hospitality are more common. Similar to the urban/rural divide in the other parts of the state, there is a significant difference in diversity as well.

The district should extend out along the southern lakefront and – unlike some iterations of the commission maps – draw in the entirety of the Oneida Nation to keep that community of interest whole.

Because the neighboring 21st district to the north needs to gain 72,000 voters (and can only go south) the city of Rome should be the northern border of the 22nd district and the outlying ares should be the southernmost border of the 21st.

Rome would continue to be grouped with the nearby city of Utica, given the shared economic and cultural interests of those two cities, but the 21st would need to gain neighboring Herkimer County. The 22nd district could also extend south, picking up the counties of Madison, Chenango, and Cortland, and adding in the nearby lake communities around Cayuga Lake and Seneca Lake.

### New York's 20th Congressional District:

The Capital Region should have a district situated around Albany, to the west of the Hudson River that includes all of Albany, Schenectady, and all of Saratoga Counties. This is similar to the existing 20th seat and may only need to add small portions of neighboring Montgomery County to balance out the population.

### **New York's 21st Congressional District:**

As stated above, the northernmost New York district now called the 21st must grow south, extending into eastern Oswego, northern Oneida (along the lake), all of Herkimer, Fulton, Montgomery, and northern Rensselaer counties. This scenic district should retain the rural quality of its communities, even as it expands

geographically. This Adirondack Mountain seat is home to the largest forestland in New York State, and the areas we suggest are similarly forested regions just outside the current lines. The communities around the Mohawk River Valley should be the southern border since those communities would share similar economic drivers in the tourism and agricultural industries – particularly the dairy industry.

### **The Hudson Valley:**

### **New York's 19th Congressional District:**

The 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> Congressional districts should be Hudson River districts, and group together the communities that have grown around the water. These communities share similar priorities and assets, namely environmental conservation, tourism and cultural cultivation, educational institutions, Revolutionary War landmarks, and significant freight, commuter and passenger rail lines like Metro North and Amtrak. They also all struggle with infrastructure challenges, economic revitalization, and in some cases crime and poverty.

The Upper Hudson, Catskill Mountain, and Mohawk Valley seat, now the 19th, would go south of what is now the 21st on the eastern side of the Hudson River. This seat would take in nearly all of Columbia County, allowing the district to encircle Albany County. The 19th would connect the northern Hudson Valley river communities to the east by travelling south between the mountains that border the river (roughly Route 9) and the Hudson River itself, uniting the voters on both sides of this important natural feature. The Walkway Over the Hudson should be the southern border of the district, which then continues over the river and to the city of New Paltz, Woodstock, and SUNY New Paltz. Again, these communities would be united in their shared comparative diversity, their historical cultural connection to the region, as well as educational and economic assets.

On the western side of the Hudson River, the 19th would still include all of Schoharie, Delaware, and Greene, but would also connect all of Binghamton and surrounding Broome County to Ithaca and the southern half of Tompkins County. This would unite technology and educational hubs around Poughkeepsie in the Hudson Valley with some technology hubs in Binghamton and the Capital Region.

This district would stretch from the Hudson Valley to Tompkins County, through the Catskills and along the communities around the Susquehanna River just as the late Rep. Maurice Hinchey's district once did.

The communities and urban centers of Tompkins County are similar to the communities in and around Kingston, New Paltz, and Poughkeepsie and grouping

those areas is a smart way to find similar communities without breaking up other communities of interest in nearby districts.

Population growth from the lower Hudson and the suburban New York City counties means the 19th cannot grow south – those lower districts are already growing upward to find similar populations. And, as we have stated before, the northernmost seat (the 21st) must grow because of population loss, and cannot grow north into Canada. In order for the 21st to pick up similar communities of interest it needs to grow south, because growing west would mean disrupting the communities of interest that make up the 24th and 22nd seats.

In sum, the 19th is being pushed by population changes from below and above its existing borders and must reach west to put similar communities of interest within the same district.

# **New York's 18th Congressional District:**

The Mid-Hudson seat, now known as the 18th, should largely be a Hudson Highlands seat, existing among and between the mountains that surround the Hudson River, and then out into the surrounding farming communities. The 18th does need to pick up some of the current 19<sup>th</sup>. The best option is to add the dairy farming communities in the outlying areas of Ulster County, thereby uniting them with the blackdirt farming communities in Orange County. Nestled in this Orange County farmland is the Orthodox Jewish community of Palm Tree. This community's infrastructure needs are closely connected with the river towns, so keeping them together makes the most sense.

As in the 19th, this seat would also seek to unite the river communities on the east and west of the Hudson. In the western portion of the district along the river, the lines should match the current district's configuration stopping at the Orange/Rockland border.

On the eastern side of the Hudson, the district would roughly follow along the North-South thoroughfare of the Taconic Parkway that distinguishes between the Highlands towns along the Hudson in the western parts of Westchester, Dutchess and Putnam Counties. The eastern parts of those counties that are more sparsely populated Connecticut and Massachusetts border communities should be in the 16th because of their shared concerns with other people in that district.

Uniting these riverfront communities along the mountains will allow their Representative in Congress to focus on best representing their transportation, energy infrastructure, water, environmental protection, historical preservation, and economic development needs.

On the east side of the river, the 18th should grow south into Ossining. This would unite the cities and towns along routes 9 and 9D like Peekskill, Montrose, Buchanan, and Croton-on-Hudson with the very similar communities like Beacon, Wappingers Falls, Cold Spring, and Garrison to the north. The eastward lines should include Chappaqua, Katonah, and Mt Kisco – roughly following the Saw Mill River Parkway or the Metro North's Harlem line to the New Croton Reservoir, keeping those commuter line properties together. The district would then use the Taconic Parkway as the eastern border, up through Westchester and Putnam Counties. The Taconic is an important regional dividing line in the region and serves as a main north south route of travel to New York City.

#### **New York's 17th Congressional District:**

This congressional district must grow north and west from the suburban Westchester County cities of Yonkers and White Plains and into Rockland via the Mario Cuomo Bridge. Therefore, we believe that those Westchester towns should be connected to the densely packed communities in Rockland County, like Stony Point, Ramapao, and Haverstraw which should extend up to the smaller urban centers like Port Jervis and Callicoon along the Pennsylvania border up the western half of Orange and Sullivan Counties.

This district would be similar to the district represented by former Congressman Maurice Hinchey, albeit more southerly. These communities in Westchester, Rockland, Orange and Sullivan are closely matched urban and suburban communities with outcroppings of forestland, camping grounds, suburban hideouts, and tourist spots along the Lower Catskills and Callicoon Hills and the Upper Delaware River Basin.

### **New York City:**

Ultimately the goal through much of the city should be that of least change since the courts designed these districts with communities of interest in mind during the last redistricting cycle. A new map should align those previously defined communities with the shifts in population, allowing the new map to reflect the priorities of the old. This goal means preserving or expanding the ability of minority communities to elect the Representatives of their choosing without packing like-voters into one seat or another and reducing the overall number of members these voters can send to Congress.

#### **New York's 16th Congressional District:**

The 16th district must grow north to keep whole the communities of interest in the Hudson Highlands in the Hudson Valley. Like the New York redistricting commission,

we believe this district should retain the culturally important community of Co-Op City and then move north immediately across the Bronx border to the similar cities of Mount Vernon and Yonkers. These cities should be paired with the city of Port Chester, a predominantly Hispanic/Latino community along the Connecticut border via Bronxville.

The district should continue moving south of and to the east of Scarsdale and White Plains to continue north, drawing in another Hispanic/Latino city in Brewster in the more sparsely populated areas of eastern Putnam, west of the mountains. In order to create a Hudson Highlands district in the 18th, the 16th should pick up the more rural areas in the Taconics, along eastern Dutchess. Drawing these communities together will help unite these border towns and farming communities to the east of the mountain ranges that border the river.

### **New York's 13th Congressional District:**

NY-13 must move north to the Westchester border, accounting for the expansions of districts in southern New York City. The 13th should maintain its Western border with the 15th between the Bronx and Manhattan. The 13th is pushed slightly north of Central Park to Harlem, while allowing the 10th to take parts of Morningside Heights in order to keep Columbia University whole. Because we want to maintain the strength of communities in this and neighboring districts, the 13th would need to go around the 15th and pick up like communities in the East Bronx. The growth of this district to the east of The Bronx River Forest would unite important New York City Housing Authority properties in Gun Hill, Parkside, and the East Bronx. The border should run along Gun Hill Rd as the Northern border of the 16th, up to Pelham Pkwy and the Southern border with the 14th.

### **New York's 15th Congressional District:**

The 15th district, a long-established and extremely compact majority-minority district, should be the least-changed seat in any configuration. The only change would be to pick up voters in the Bronx along its Southern or western border to help balance the population. The 15th should be kept whole to maintain its border with the 13th to the east and 12th on its southern border.

#### **New York's 12th Congressional District:**

The 12th district will also largely remain the same, expanding slightly north beyond the Upper East Side into Lower East Harlem, to account for the loss of some voters

in the Lower East Side as a result of expanding districts in the south. This growth north would also keep the majority of the 12th's voters in Manhattan. As a result, the 12th would lose all of Brooklyn but keep most of the neighborhoods in western Queens along the East River, only losing the neighborhoods to the south and east of Jackson and Northern Boulevards.

#### **New York's 14th Congressional District:**

Again, the 14th district should also remain largely the same, maintaining its borders to the east with the 12th and the 15th to the North and west. Just as in the other New York City seats, population shifts in the south will naturally push the 14th north, growing into Westchester County. The communities of Pelham, Pelham Manor, and New Rochelle would help to balance the population in the district and are very closely connected to neighboring communities. These predominantly Black and Latino communities are vibrant, densely populated cousins to the New York City neighborhoods just across the border. The growth of neighboring congressional districts pushes the 14th to below the Pelham Parkway.

#### **New York's 6th Congressional District:**

The 6th district is the heart of the city's AAPI population and must remain so. The seat should largely maintain its current configuration but may lose portions of Queens to the east because of the need for population expansion in the districts on Long Island.

### **New York's 7th Congressional District:**

The 7th district should also largely maintain its current configuration, keeping its western Brooklyn community whole, adding some voters in the Lower East Side, and largely maintaining its border with the old 12th district to the north. The district needs to add a few thousand people, so it can grow into the neighborhoods just east of the Greenwood Cemetery.

#### **New York's 9th Congressional District:**

The 9th district should also be a least-change district, maintaining its borders with the 7th and 8th districts to the east, west and north, but adding some voters just west of Homecrest along Ocean Avenue serving as a dividing line for business and transit communities between the 10th and 9th districts.

### **New York's 8th Congressional District:**

Similarly, the 8th district should barely change, maintaining its borders to the west with the 9th and north with the 7th. The 8th will lose some voters in the east to the 5th district because the districts along Long Island must gain population and move west.

### **New York's 10th Congressional District:**

The 10th district should continue to be a Manhattan to Brooklyn district, connecting Lower Manhattan to Brooklyn via the Brooklyn Bridge given the shared interests of those two communities on each side of the bridge. The 10th starts just north of Central Park, including all of Columbia University and the Cathedral of St. John the Divine. It would then extend down to Lower Manhattan between the 12th and 11th districts, to include the 9/11 Memorial and NewYork-Presbyterian Lower Manhattan Hospital.

To better connect the Brooklyn communities that are now divided across districts, the district should follow the enacted map's vision, extending this seat from Borough Park down to Dyker Heights and south, along Ocean Parkway to eastern Gravesend by Coney Island Hospital.

### **New York's 11th Congressional District:**

The seat in Staten Island must grow by nearly 11,000 people. There are only two ways to grow, either into Brooklyn or into Manhattan. Growing further into Brooklyn presents several obstacles, namely diluting minority voices in Sunset Parks or Coney Island. Instead, the map should try to reduce the district's Brooklyn footprint and grow into the west side of Manhattan. The 11th will keep its core communities in Staten Island and better serve the district by connecting the island to Lower Manhattan, via the ferry lines, where there is a natural shared interest. The 11th should then extend along the Hudson River, adding communities west of the 9/11 Memorial and up, taking in important transportation features like the Lincoln and Holland tunnels and all of the piers up to 59th street. This district would capture many of the ferry routes that tens of thousands of New Yorkers travel every day and the bridges and tunnels traversed by thousands more. These Hudson River and New Jersey border communities share many of the same transportation and housing needs and are intimately connected to one another.

The seat would still need some parts of Brooklyn, following along the Verrazzano Narrows Bridge and keeping the shoreline communities around Bay Ridge, Bath Beach, and Dyker Beach Park. These communities are connected by their shared

interest in combating climate change and mitigating damages from natural disasters and rising waters.

### **New York's 5th Congressional District:**

As the Long Island seats grow west, the 5th district can now be wholly within New York City. The communities on the eastern border of the district in Nassau County would be added to the new 4th Congressional District, to help that seat pick up needed population. This change on the easternmost border of the district necessitates adding some neighboring communities on its western border with the 8th – nearly extending to Brooklyn – and the northern edges of the 6th – likely the southern portions of Flushing and Hollis Hills. These changes would keep these neighboring communities together, rather than linking residents of Nassau County with New York City residents, and maintaining the power of minority voices in the city.

#### **Long Island:**

#### **New York's 4th Congressional District:**

Continuing along the Atlantic Ocean, the southwestern Long Island seat now called the 4th should keep Long Island whole, and pick up only a tiny piece of easternmost Queens around the Belmont Park racetrack, extending up to the Queens Children's Psychiatric Hospital to Route 495 and down the county line to New Hyde Park, again making the 5th an entirely New York City district.

### **New York's 2nd Congressional District:**

As one of the largest cities in New York, this map would give Hempstead two representatives in Congress, with the western part of the city in the 4th and the eastern part of the city in the 2nd. The district would then continue along the south shore, including the shoretown neighborhoods in Freeport, Merrick, Massapequa, Amityville, and Copiague.

The district would reunite the larger Nassau County towns of Roosevelt, Levittown, and East Meadow. Depending on how map drawers design the western edges of the district, these changes allow for the potential of a new majority-minority seat in the New York delegation, if not today, then certainly by the end of the decade.

# New York's 1st Congressional District:

The easternmost Long Island seat now called the 1st would be very similar to the enacted map, only losing communities like Smithtown and Nissequoge, while adding Ronkonkoma, Great River, and East Islip to its western edge.

# New York's 3rd Congressional District:

The northwestern Long Island seat should also remain largely the same, extending east to add similar Long Island Sound communities like Port Jefferson, Stony Brook, and Smithtown.

Like the Unity Map, we believe the 3rd should unite the Long Island Sound communities of interest on both sides of the estuary, linking the shoreline towns of Mamaroneck, Larchmont, and Rye to Kings Point, Sands Point, and Bayville. These communities are closely connected to the water in terms of culture, economy, tourism, and leisure activities. They are also most closely related in their infrastructure, environmental conservation, and pollution mitigation needs.

The western edge should add sister communities in the northern edge of Queens around Little Neck Bay and the Little Bay like Bayside or Little Neck.

Members of the Commission and Members of the Westchester Delegation:

I recall when I was a member of the State Assembly we were faced with the possibility of dividing Yonkers into several Assembly districts such that there would not be a single district wholly contained within the City. With the help of many members, including some of those receiving this message now, we succeeded in rejecting that plan in favor of one that kept at least one district wholly within the City. We believed it was essential that the City would have at least one representative who would represent the interests of the City only, and that the City's voice would not be diminished.

Now, as you consider Congressional redistricting, the same can be said for Westchester County. There should be at least one Congressional District that is wholly within the borders of Westchester County. New York City has many members who represent portions of that City, and that City only. Fairness demands that Westchester have a least one member who represents the County, and the County only.

Notwithstanding the efforts of those members of Congress who have represented portions of Westchester for the past ten years, our voice has been diminished simply due to the nature of the districts. Now there is an opportunity to redress the balance and make things right.

I urge that the State Legislature adopt a map that has at least one Congressional District wholly within Westchester. It is entirely possible to accomplish this, and now is the time to do so. Although Westchester shares much in common with our neighbors to the south, north and west, we also have many unique needs and characteristics. Those needs can best be met by having a representative who answers to Westchester County, and who must not be expected to straddle the needs of both Westchester and the nation's biggest city to our south.

#### Dear Directors Blatt and Breakell:

The new redistricting map made by the Independent Redistricting Committee totally disenfranchises two distinct yet historically connected African American communities that have voted together for 30+ years and elected representation that reflected its interests in homeownership, economic empowerment, and social issues.

The present 35th Assembly District has African American communities in North Corona, East Elmhurst, Lefrak City and Sherwood Apartments that has enabled an Assembly Member to go to Albany and make legislative appropriations that address social inequities that manifest in drug abuse, allow for the creation and maintenance of a growing senior citizen population, and create programming support for youth betterment through sport and job training.

There is also a strong connection with these communities and LaGuardia Airport where opportunities have always been present for franchise ownership serving the unending stream of passengers passing through, and for service contracts in the airport facility.

Presently, issues around automobile traffic (with its resultant congestion and pollution) and alternative means of transportation to and from this upgraded airport are being debated. Obviously, this State issue has a major impact on the surrounding community's quality of life.

In addition, cultural institutions in Flushing Meadows-Corona Park have historically been a part of this district as these two communities are connected both geographically and through local usage of these important areas.

The proposed new Assembly District lines take the 10,000+ residents in North Corona and East Elmhurst and put them in a newly created 34th Assembly District. It takes the 2,500+ residents of Lefrak City and Sherwood Apartments and puts them in the newly created 39th Assembly District. Neither of the two new ADs have residents with the same number of ethnicities that would empower either community as one would be overwhelming Hispanic, while the other White, Orthodox Jewish (Russian ancestry), North Asian and Indian (south Asia).

This strong Black community presently served by the 35<sup>th</sup> Assembly District would disappear – as its votes would be diluted with the inability to elect its own representative.

Redistricting is a difficult process as many competing interests and groups look to have their voices heard. Yet, this "cracking" of a district draws lines that decrease Black

representation in an area that has consistently elected the Black community's candidate of choice. The drawing of a legislative line should <u>not</u> cause harm to minority votes; rather, it should reflect a "portrait" of the people they represent, with all their nuances and special features.

The preservation of existing political communities reflected in the cores of prior districts must include racial fairness to have meaningful representation. The proposed new lines do not reflect this priority; they would divide the political representation of these African American communities ensuring their minority status thereby reducing – if not eliminating - their power to be adequately represented in State government.

Any new legislative lines drawn pursuant to the 2020 Census, must take these factors into account before any map is finalized. The African American communities of North Corona, East Elmhurst, Lefrak City and Sherwood Apartments must be kept together in a unified Assembly District.

There is also a strong connection with these communities and LaGuardia Airport where opportunities have always been present for franchise ownership serving the unending stream of passengers passing through, and for service contracts in the airport facility.

Presently, issues around automobile traffic (with its resultant congestion and pollution) and alternative means of transportation to and from this upgraded airport are being debated. Obviously, this State issue has a major impact on the surrounding community's quality of life.

In addition, cultural institutions in Flushing Meadows-Corona Park have historically been a part of this district as these two communities are connected both geographically and through local usage of these important areas.

The proposed new Assembly District lines take the 10,000+ residents in North Corona and East Elmhurst and put them in a newly created 34th Assembly District. It takes the 2,500+ residents of Lefrak City and Sherwood Apartments and puts them in the newly created 39th Assembly District. Neither of the two new ADs have residents with the same number of ethnicities that would empower either community as one would be overwhelming Hispanic, while the other White, Orthodox Jewish (Russian ancestry), North Asian and Indian (south Asia).

This strong Black community presently served by the 35<sup>th</sup> Assembly District would disappear – as its votes would be diluted with the inability to elect its own representative.

Redistricting is a difficult process as many competing interests and groups look to have their voices heard. Yet, this "cracking" of a district draws lines that decrease Black

representation in an area that has consistently elected the Black community's candidate of choice. The drawing of a legislative line should <u>not</u> cause harm to minority votes; rather, it should reflect a "portrait" of the people they represent, with all their nuances and special features.

The preservation of existing political communities reflected in the cores of prior districts must include racial fairness to have meaningful representation. The proposed new lines do not reflect this priority; they would divide the political representation of these African American communities ensuring their minority status thereby reducing – if not eliminating - their power to be adequately represented in State government.

Any new legislative lines drawn pursuant to the 2020 Census, must take these factors into account before any map is finalized. The African American communities of North Corona, East Elmhurst, LeFrak City and Sherwood Apartments must be kept together in a unified Assembly District.

Dear Members of the Independent Redistricting Commission:

Now that the Commission has failed to propose a single set of maps endorsed by the requisite majority of its members, the New York State Legislature is likely to reject the Commission's first proposals. As a concerned resident of Westchester County, I urge you to recognize the importance of maintaining Westchester's independent voice and not having it split apart and diluted by surrounding areas of New York City. The City of New York is a unique urban center with an infrastructure of its own, like none other in the state, and a set of issues and concerns that are wholly distinct from suburban communities like Westchester. If the Commission is given the opportunity to propose a second set of maps, it should use that opportunity to unite areas of Westchester County.

It appears that both maps under consideration would continue to artificially link portions of the north Bronx with portions of Westchester in one district, while drawing another district that would link Westchester with portions of both the Bronx and Queens. These maps are fundamentally flawed because they dilute the voice of both the suburban community in Westchester (and Putnam counties) and the New York City community in the Bronx and Queens. The district linking Westchester with both the Bronx and Queens is particularly unfair and unacceptable because it divides communities in **three** counties, limiting the ability of residents in each part of the district to have an elected official who can effectively represent their interests.

During last year's public hearings, when residents of New Rochelle testified before the Independent Redistricting Commission, several were asked by Commissioners whether they would want a district connecting New Rochelle to Queens. None said yes, yet the Commission still drew a Queens to New Rochelle district in both of its proposals. Rather than having District 14 be contained entirely in New York City and District 16 be the only district to cross the Westchester/Bronx border, as was proposed in the earlier Names and Letters draft plans, the Commission inexplicably decided to cross the county border twice. This decision divides communities throughout the region and would especially dilute the voice of the community of southern Westchester centered around Scarsdale and northern New Rochelle. This area has shared infrastructure and institutions, and both proposals would split this community into not two but three different Congressional Districts.

When the lines were last redrawn, New Rochelle, Scarsdale and other parts of Westchester were joined with the Bronx. Now, ten years later, the Commission's proposals would further dilute Westchester's voice. I urge you to reassess the Congressional map and take action to ensure that Westchester County is not unduly divided.
